2006 was a remarkable year. The major renovations to the Brighouse Branch of Richmond Public Library (RPL) were completed in April and the community now has fantastic displays of popular and best selling books; a brand new TD Canada Trust Language Learning Centre; dozens more study carrels; a new Computer Centre; comfortable reading lounges; silent and group study areas and seminar rooms; expanded program space; the Ben and Esther Dayson Reading Lounge; a self-serve DVD Dispenser and more self-checkout stations. As always, staff work tirelessly to provide customers with a positive and welcoming library experience.

With the introduction of the new Ralphy Library Card and Hamilton Library Services, RPL is busier than ever. Sincere thanks go to our special Friends of the Library (FOL) group, who are dedicated to supporting RPL through fundraising and volunteer efforts. The community, of course, knows them best for their popular book sales, and their partnership with us is invaluable. Thanks to the FOL's generous \$5,000 donation, Steveston Branch doubled the size of its kids' French book collection. Sincere thanks also go to our donors, partners and Library Board Trustees who are all central to the success of Richmond Public Library.

HIGHLIGHTS

The Ralphy Library Card

Thanks to a generous grant from the Ministry of Education, Public Library Services Branch, RPL carried out the BC OneCard province-wide library card initiative by creating a library card and awareness campaign. Introduced in fall 2006, **Rediscover Your Library: Go Anywhere, Learn Anything, Read Every Day**[©] is the first phase of the campaign and focuses on children. It features the unique round Ralphy Library Card designed by children's author/illustrator Trevor Lai. Over 1,600 kids and adults attended the Ralphy Card launch in March



2007. By the end of May, 3,553 people had registered for a Ralphy Card! We believe it's the *world's first round library card*. Thanks go to the Richmond Sunrise Rotary Club and Vancity for sponsoring book prizes.



Brighouse Branch Renovations

Thanks to Mayor Brodie and City Council for their strong support and valuable contribution of \$1,031,700 towards the library renovations, the Brighouse Branch had a total makeover. Renovations were complete in April 2006 and the new Brighouse Branch is extremely popular. Customers borrowed 33.5% more books, DVDs and other items than the previous year and borrowing at all RPL branches increased over 18%. Staff registered 16,863 new library card customers last year alone, and these huge increases were accomplished with no additional staffing. A Canada/British Columbia Infrastructure Grant of \$1.738 million dollars also enabled us to make changes that impact the community in many positive ways.



Hamilton Library Service


People living in the Hamilton area now have access to popular weekly RPL services in their neighbourhood, thanks to \$100,000 in funding from the City of Richmond.



Offering kids' programs, library card registration, book borrowing and returns and advice choosing books, the collection contains kids, teens and adult books. The first phase of the library service, offered from June 2007 until the end of August, takes place at the Hamilton Community Centre. Library services are carried out in partnership with the Hamilton Community Association and Richmond Family Place.

S.U.C.C.E.S.S. Richmond Youth Campaign

Committed to promoting the benefits and importance of respecting library materials as well as the rights of all library users, S.U.C.C.E.S.S. Richmond Youth partnered with RPL to launch "*My Library, Your Library, Everybody*'s *Library,*" a public education and awareness campaign. Their interactive program of activities for the community included a video, contests, displays, pamphlets, original comics and more. The S.U.C.C.E.S.S. Richmond Youth are remarkable role models for the community, and are totally committed to protecting the resources in our libraries so that everyone can fully enjoy them.
