

# Expect innovation, creativity and expansion to continue at Richmond Public Library.

In 2014 your library will introduce a couple of **new and exciting spaces** thanks to the vision of our members:

**The Community Bulletin** will be an area where our members can expect a more personalized and participatory library experience by easily finding library information, programs, and events that interest them. Members can "check in " to find relevant library information or "check out" all of the upcoming library events and programs. As our community continues to grow, Richmond Public Library will be the key resource to help members stay connected with their community.

**The Launchpad** will be a collaborative workspace where members can engage in digital and technological learning opportunities. Interactive innovations and technology will be accessible for members to create and generate projects. 3D printers, digital creation stations and scanners will provide members with the opportunity to work collaboratively and share resources that encourage social interaction and learning. This year members can also look forward to an exciting new Innovator-in-Residence program that will introduce them to our 3D printers and showcase the diverse learning opportunities this new technology presents.

# 2013 Annual Highlights

In 2013, Richmond Public Library saw several significant changes to its library services, collections and programming. Thanks to \$73,410 funding from the federal government's Community Infrastructure Improvement Fund, the library's wireless digital services have improved significantly. The funding allowed the library to upgrade the wireless broadband service within all four Richmond library branches, and expand it to include Richmond Cultural Centre, the Minoru Place Activity Centre, Minoru Aquatic Centre, Minoru Arenas and Steveston Community Centre.

Library programming continues to be well attended as programs led by community members and staff had a total of **75,906 attendees** at **2,684 programs.** The library was also delighted to offer Richmond residents its latest digital service, e-Video, which provides a collection of **over 5,000 movies and TV shows** for adults and children. Members can watch eight items per month, which includes any combination of movies and TV shows, through their internet browser or through a downloadable app on their smart devices.



## Celebrating the Dr. Lee Collection

Dr. and Mrs. Kwok-Chu Lee once again extended their remarkable generosity to Richmond Public Library in 2013. In October, Richmond Public Library received another sizable donation of 26,105 books with an estimated value of \$970,000. This donation provided the library with a treasure of books for our Special Collection on Chinese Culture. The related "The Joy of Reading: Appreciation of Chinese Literature" programs had more than 400 participants. Richmond Public Library would like to thank Dr. and Mrs. Lee for their outstanding generosity.

## Donation Highlight: Chinese Art

The Chinese art collection that is part of the Dr. Kwok-Chu Lee donation is a dream collection for professional artists, students and researchers. The focus is on Chinese calligraphy and painting. There are art albums of ancient masters and contemporary artists; dictionaries; catalogues of museums, exhibitions, and auctions; art history; art theory; rubbings of engravings on cliffs, tombstones and signs; as well as a large number of copybooks by calligraphers from different dynasties in different calligraphic scripts. There are also many books on other art forms, such as seal carving, sculpture, frescos, woodblock printing, sketching, architecture, costumes, theatre, Chinese gardens, and Japanese and Western art.
